Last week, 140 leaders from the health, business, higher education, faith, communities and stewardship sectors got together in Chicago at the "Path to Positive - MomentUs 2014 Leadership Summit" to share thoughts and collaborate on moving America forward on climate solutions. The enthusiasm and thoughtful participation of the group generated great ideas, new opportunities, real inspiration, a sense of hope, and a yearning for more collaboration. The Summit started with a celebratory dinner on Wednesday night, featuring a whole room discussion around the topic "Why are You Here?" Over 40 participants grabbed the mic and talked about their passion, their successes and their needs as they work to solve climate challenge.

The Summit meeting itself started with introductory comments by Bob Perkowitz of ecoAmerica. He told his "conversion story" that resulted in a shift of his life's work toward climate solutions, and about available technological and policy solutions awaiting public support and political will for implementation. He urged participants to think bigger and bolder on the "Path to Positive."

David Yarnold, President of the National Audubon Society, introduced Session I: **We Can Do It: Climate and Solutions**. Panelists Dr. Jane Lubchenco, former Administrator of NOAA; Danny Kennedy, Co-Founder and Senior Vice President at Sungevity; Dr. Michael Mann, Director of the Earth System Science Center at Pennsylvania State University; and Geof Rochester, Managing Director of The Nature Conservancy all talked about their work and tangible successes on climate solutions. Their very different strategies ranged from building the residential solar industry, to engaging Harley Davidson owners in conservation. The presentations were followed by table discussions where ideas from all the participants were gathered and displayed in real time.

The second session, **A Challenge For All Of Us: Climate and Society**, featured Dr. Antonio Flores, President of the Hispanic Association of Colleges & Universities; Dr. Georges Benjamin, Executive Director of the American Public Health Association; Kathy Gerwig, Vice President of Employee Safety, Health and Wellness and Environmental Stewardship Officer at Kaiser Permanente; Steve Nicholas, VP for US Programs at the Institute for Sustainable Communities; and Rev. Gabriel Salguero, President of the National Latino Evangelical Coalition. They engaged in a panel discussion about the impacts of climate change on their sector, and what their organizations were doing to make a difference.

Session III: **Building Momentum For Change - Our Time Is Now** recognized the fact that our nation makes progress on substantial issues when powerful American institutions lead. Introduced by ecoAmerica Director Lisa Renstrom, Rev. Elder Dr. Nancy Wilson, Moderator of the Metropolitan Community Church talked about the success factors of the marriage equality movement. Rev. Jim Wallis, Founder and CEO of Sojourners, discussed about lessons in immigration reform from the faith perspective. Gary Cohen, Founder and President of Health Care Without Harm covered the health care access movement. Rounding out the group, Harold Swimmer, President and CEO of the American Lung Association explained the challenges and victories of the stop smoking movement.

Tracy Russ and Meighen Speiser from ecoAmerica then led Session IV: **Empowered For Action - Prepared and Ready**. They described Path to Positive vision, principles and commitment, and reviewed the new Blessed Tomorrow program designed to engage leaders within the faith community to lead by example and engage others to do the same.

ecoAmerica "starts with people," and at the MomentUs Leadership Summit, it ended with them too. All of the participants are accomplished leaders and could have been on stage telling their story. In the end, as Bob commented, it's up to us. We need to refresh and renew ourselves, think bigger and bolder, and collaborate more powerfully. Our biggest task is to move society toward supporting effective solutions as quickly as possible, and whatever part of the climate solution you're working on, it needs to include building public support and political will.
